Drum Majors' Dress Belts and Staffs*

In 1926 a standard pattern staff was introduced for the RNSM as well as for many of the C-in-Cs bands. The year before the Adjutant General had given orders for the standardisation of Drum Majors' dress belts, by 1929 the trend for uniformity had continued with the introduction of a common pattern staff for Divisional Bands.

Records of this standardisation process have survived at The National Archives and are contained in ADM1/8808. Within this file are sketches produced by each Division of the staffs in use during the 1920s.






Fig 2 Sketch of the Drum Major's Mace and Pace Stick [sic] in use at the Depot, 1929

* ADM1/8808 also shows that the each part of the Corps had a different name for the Drum Major's Staff. During the 1920s the RMA referred to it as a Staff, Plymouth Division referred to it as a Stave whilst the Depot called theirs a Mace, by the 1950s the use of Stave was prevalent whilst this in turn has changed to the current practise of referring to the Drum Major's Staff.





After much correspondence the Portsmouth Staff, similar to the RMA and Depot Staffs, was used as the basis for the standard pattern—the design that is still in use today.
